I promised last month that I would give a report on my meeting with the Council’s Head of Halls in an attempt to break a 35 year deadlock for the provision of a central space to hold the Village History Archive – well, here it is.....

I met with Teresa McTeague (BPC’s Head of Halls) and Nicola Copland (Parish Clerk) on Tuesday 6 th at the new Community Hall. I was given a tour of the new Hall when it became clear that there was no suitable space, given its current space provision for an upper (smaller) and a lower hall. We then went to the Parish Hall and revisited the old and new parts. Here there was a possible space but as with all things it depends on priorities. In the public consultation for the proposed Parish Hall extension, people were asked about needs and space usage. When all the votes and suggestions were analysed the top priority, and rightly so, was the need for a better Parish Office - this we now have. Second was for the safe storage of Benson’s History Archive and this we still don’t have. I have sympathy for those having to allocate the minimal space available but the provision of safe storage for the documented history of our Village that villagers see as a significant priority, must surely take precedence when allocating available storage space.

The website for the History Group that shows a small amount of the part of the Archive which they have been able to digitise and catalogue is: - <https://www.bensingtonhistory.org> . The centralisation of the Archive will allow them to catalogue and digitise the rest and put it into cloud storage for all to access as required. I will make a presentation on the above case to the Council in October.
